James Mayhew

James Mayhew is an award-winning children's author and illustrator. He has been creating books for over 30 years, and his many titles include the best-selling Katie series, Ella Bella Ballerina, and Once Upon A Tune, inspired by the many musicians and symphony orchestras he has collaborated with. A companion volume A Symphony of Stories was published in Autumn 2024. His highly acclaimed concerts incorporate art, created in time to the music, live on stage.

His collaborators include the BBC National Orchestra of Wales, Royal Scottish National Orchestra, Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, London Mozart Players and the Britten Sinfonia, bringing classics like Peter and the Wolf, The Four Seasons and The Firebird to life in paint. James taught illustration on the UK's first Masters programme in Children's Book Illustration at Cambridge School of Art (Anglia Ruskin University) for over 20 years.

He is a regular visitor to both literary and music festivals at home and internationally. James lives in Suffolk, with his husband Toto and Diva the dog, where the big skies and gentle light are perfect for artists.




A Symphony of Stories



The book introduces young readers to his work and legacy through colourful illustrations and storytelling. Through her diverse body of work, Shane continues to share her passion for art, creativity, and imagination across multiple platforms and audiences.




Gustavo Bacarisas

Melanie is a primary school teacher from Gibraltar whose life purpose is to help the youth become resilient and embrace selfbelief when enduring difficulties.




She recently published her first book with the Trust and hopes to develop her career in the field of heritage.



Me Acuerdo: Memories of Gibraltar's Old Town

Rebecca Fa's workshop will explore the importance of preserving living memory, beginning with a presentation on life in Gibraltar 70 years ago and her experience interviewing her grandmother for her book. Students will practice interviewing each other with guided questions, then share insights in a group discussion. The session will conclude with Rebecca encouraging students to record stories grandparents or community elders to deepen their understanding of Gibraltar's past, with the possibility of developing the project further in schools.


I hope that my stories achieve this and, whether you are 1 or 100, I hope that they offer you the happiness that can only truly be enjoyed through the wonder of literature.

In her late teens, she became a well-known radio and TV presenter with Gibraltar Broadcasting Corporation, where she spent nine years before continuing to create special programmes on her return to the Rock.


Influenced by her poet father, Sonia published her first poetry book in the Bahamas and has since released several more, alongside short stories, a children's book, and a coffee table collection. release Her 2023 Seeking Inspiration sold out quickly, raising part of the £7,000 she has donated to cancer charities. A breast cancer survivor herself, she founded The Bosom Buddies Cancer Trust and was awarded the British Empire Medal for her charitable work. On her 80th birthday, she published her first thriller, The Curtain Call, exploring themes of obsessive love.

Kieron Prescott

I'm Kieron Prescott, author of "The Shadows We Call Home: A Tale of Transformation and the Pursuit of Truth", a fable-like novella that blends fantasy and philosophy to explore life's deeper questions.

By day I work in the insurance industry, but I've always been drawn to questions about perception, identity, and meaning - the kind of questions we all ask at some point, even if we don't say them out loud. My writing is inspired by Stoicism and thinkers like Carl Jung, Aldous Huxley and Sydney Banks. It's about questioning the reality we often take for granted, and exploring how our thoughts create that reality, whether we're aware of it or not.


Understanding this can help us live with a little more clarity, calm, and peace of mind. I believe philosophy doesn't have to be heavy or dense but can also be fun and accessible. While I'm not an experienced speaker, I'm passionate about sharing the ideas in my book with young people, especially those who might be questioning the world around them.



The Shadows We Call Home

The workshop aims to guide students through the core ideas behind the book in a thought-provoking, accessible way. Using visual prompts, thought experiments, and real-life examples, we'll explore questions like: Who am I, really? Can I change how I feel by changing how I think? How much of what I believe is true? The goal is to help students reflect on their inner world, challenge limiting beliefs, and leave with a greater sense of self-awareness.

Manolo Galliano is a Gibraltarian author and historian with a lifelong passion for the Rock's history and culture. He has written several books about Gibraltar's streets, churches, and traditions, including A Rocky Labyrinth, Beyond the Ramparts, and Pan Dulces & Mince Pies, which celebrate our unique Llanito heritage.

Manolo is also a former Trustee of the Gibraltar Heritage Trust and has dedicated many years to protecting and sharing Gibraltar's past. He enjoys bringing history to life by telling the stories behind our buildings, streets, and customs, helping young people discover the rich heritage that surrounds them every day.





Various Books



Alice Mascarenhas

Alice Mascarenhas, MBE, is the daughter of the late Manolo Mascarenhas, and is a wellknown Gibraltarian journalist and broadcaster herself. Her career spans nearly five decades and has been marked by significant contributions to Gibraltar's media, cultural, and civic life.

In 1977 she joined the staff at Radio Gibraltar and worked extensively on GBC Television. 22 years of her professional life was spent at the Gibraltar Chronicle newspaper joining the team in 1997 as its Features Editor and later becoming its first female Deputy Editor in 2015.

After retirement, she has continued her association with the newspaper through her weekly column, Alice's Table – now the subject of seven books. She was awarded an MBE in 2019 for services to media, culture, and the arts in Gibraltar.




Palabras al Viento

Journalist and broadcaster Alice Mascarenhas MBE, presents a book on her late father, prominent journalist and broadcaster Manolo Mascarenhas, who is known for his Radio Gibraltar 1960s broadcasts of 'Palabras al Viento' as the book is aptly titled. 'Palabras al Viento' is central to this book which is not only biographical but a record of his writings in the newspapers from 1946 to 1972 and which cover most aspects of life in Gibraltar at the time.

This year's festival panel will reflect on Palabras al Viento, which helped sustain Gibraltarians' morale during the escalating Spanish political campaign and the 1969 frontier closure, preserving community identity and historical memory.

She spent more than five years as a sportswriter for the Daily Telegraph and hosted a podcast called Off The Bench. In 2024 she won the Tom Perrotta Prize, awarded by the International Tennis Writers' Association (ITWA) to a writer aged 35 or under who shows excellence in tennis journalism..




Building Champions

In addition, Justin gets commissioned to paint murals and creates art that sells to private collectors.



Graffiti: Creativity or Crime?

Graffiti has long divided opinion—artistic expression or sheer vandalism? For many, it serves as a raw, powerful voice for the marginalized, bursting with creativity, social critique, and cultural identity. Yet to others, it's an eyesore—dripping tags and etched windows that deface rather than decorate. The rise of Banksy shifted the narrative. His clever, politically charged stencils became coffee shop conversation starters and were soon embraced by the middle classes. Suddenly, street art was in vogue. But here lies the distinction—Banksy is a street artist, not a graffiti writer. True graffiti is freehand, not stencilled. It emerged from the ghettos of New York, a working-class culture that travelled the globe and spoke through trains, walls, and rooftops. I was one of those youths, captivated by its energy. This is an exploration into the origins of graffiti, the rise of street art, and the class tensions that shape both.

lan Moore is a leading stand-up comedian, known for his sharp, entertaining punditry.



The Finlaysons

Geraldine Finlayson is CEO of the Gibraltar National Museum and co-director of the Gibraltar Caves Project. She holds a PhD from Anglia Ruskin University, an MSc in Museum Studies (Leicester), and is a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries. A researcher for over 30 years, she has published 60+ papers and several books, mainly on Neanderthal landscapes, climate, and biodiversity. Her interests also include Gibraltar's cuisine, dialect, and underwater archaeology.

Stewart Finlayson is Director of the Natural History Department at the Gibraltar National Museum. His PhD focused on Neanderthals and birds, and he also researches bats through the long-running Gib-Bats project. He is a member of the IUCN Bat Specialist Group and Spanish Bat Research Council (SECEMU). A wildlife photographer and author, he has published widely on Iberian nature and Neanderthal research.

Clive Finlayson is Director, Chief Scientist, and Curator of the Gibraltar National Museum, and Beacon Professor at the University of Gibraltar. He holds a DPhil from Oxford and is an evolutionary ecologist specializing in hominin and avian biogeography. An MBE and member of Academia Europaea, he codirects the Gorham's and Vanguard Caves research. He has authored numerous influential books on human evolution and bird ecology, often illustrated with his own photography, and has advised UNESCO.



Gibraltar: A Brief History and Geography

They will discuss how the region's unique geography and natural environment have helped shape its identity over millennia, and highlight the remarkable heritage that still endures today.

Blending personal experience with historical depth, the Finlaysons will share stories, discoveries, and a visual journey through time—featuring both their own striking photographs and rare archival images. This talk offers a unique and personal perspective on Gibraltar, bringing to life the layers of history that make it such a fascinating place.
